The core of this project is to bring the history, culture, and way of life of the Chumash people—who originally lived along the central and southern coasts of California into public awareness. The Chumash are among the earliest Indigenous peoples of the West Coast.



They possessed extensive knowledge of the ocean, crafted intricate tools and artworks such as shell jewelry and canoes, and maintained unique social structures and spiritual beliefs. Through art, exhibitions, and interactive experiences, we aim to help people understand how the Chumash lived in harmony with nature and appreciate their wisdom and contributions throughout history. This endeavor encourages greater respect for and preservation of Indigenous cultures.
